

Business Plan Text Size, Fonts, & Age

A serif font has slight “tails” on the letters that lead the eye from letter to letter. Serif fonts are best for text (sentences and paragraphs), and cause less eye-strain. Examples of accepted serif fonts are: Times Roman, and Century.

A sans-serif font has letters that do not have the connecting “tails.” Sans-serif fonts quickly cause eye-fatigue when used in text. They are best used in headlines or bullets (short phrases) Examples of accepted sans-serif fonts are: Arial

10-point is smallest type size that should ever be used. Smaller than 10-point causes rapid eye-strain.
Use 11-point for ages 30-40
Use 12-point for ages 40-70
Use 14-point for ages 70+

Hints for effective Writing:

1. Use only 4-6 lines per paragraph. Large long paragraphs are difficult to read.
2. Do not right-justify. It causes eye strain.

If your document causes eye strain, the reader loses interest and finds the content frustrating.
